A SURVEY OF LIKELY NH VOTERS September 11-12, 2024

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Survey Notes

These results are from a Saint Anselm College Survey Center poll based on online surveys of 2241 New Hampshire likely voters. Surveys were collected between September 11th and 12th, 2024, from cell phone users randomly drawn from a sample of registered voters reflecting the demographic and partisan characteristics of the voting population. Names were presented in random order for the favorability and ballot tests. The survey has an overall margin of sampling error of +/- 2.1% with a confidence interval of 95%; the margin of sampling error for questions specific to congressional districts is +/- 2.9%. The data are weighted for age, gender, geography, and education based on a voter demographic model derived from historical voting patterns, but are not weighted by party registration or party identification.

Summary

New Hampshire Institute of Politics Executive Director Neil Levesque summarized the results, saying, "With the nominees in place for New Hampshire's gubernatorial and Congressional campaigns, Democrats are well-positioned to retain control of both House seats. The race to succeed retiring Governor Chris Sununu starts with a tight margin, and is likely to remain very competitive and closely watched down the stretch."

The Democratic Party continues to maintain its lead on the generic ballot. 49% of voters choose a generic Democrat versus 44% that choose a Republican. This is an improvement over August's 48%-45%.


Incumbent Chris Pappas is the most popular federal candidate on the ballot this fall. The 3-term Democratic Congressman enjoys a 52%-39% favorable image, putting him ahead of his challenger for the 1st Congressional District seat, former Executive Councilor Russell Prescott (22%-13%). In the 2nd Congressional District, first-time Democratic candidate Maggie Goodlander has a 38%-27% favorable image, somewhat better than repeat candidate Republican Lily Tang Williams (28%-22%).


The Democratic Congressional candidates both start with early leads. Pappas currently leads Prescott by 12 points, 50%-38%, while Goodlander outpaces Tang Williams by 11, 49%-38%.


Republican Kelly Ayotte starts the general election campaign for Governor with a narrow lead. The former United States Senator leads the Democratic former Mayor of Manchester Joyce Craig by 3 points, 46%-43%.

Relatively negative primary campaigns have cost both gubernatorial candidates some popularity. Both candidates are regarded unfavorably by a high number of voters, with Ayotte at a 45%-50% favorable image and Craig at 37%-36%. With control of the corner office at stake, this race is likely to be hard-fought while attracting a great deal of attention and resources.
