Advent Reflections



Friday, December 22

Hannah and Mary lived 1,000 years apart, yet reveal to us the spirit of Advent. The two mothers utter their songs in a spirit of humility that waits for God's saving action in their lives. They are songs of the anawim, poor ones who are faithful to God. As St. John Paul described, "the spirituality of the biblical 'anawim,' that is, of those faithful who not only recognize themselves as 'poor' in the detachment from all idolatry of riches and power, but also in the profound humility of a heart emptied of the temptation to pride and open to the bursting in of the divine saving grace." As the birth of Christ comes closer we are called to live out this anawim spirit.

The readings also point us to the *O Antiphon* for the day, "O King of all nations and keystone of the Church; come and save man, whom you formed from the dust." We are waiting in eager anticipation for the birth of Savior who will topple oppressive regimes and raise the lowly to great heights. Waiting for the King who will save us; mere creatures of dust. Hannah and Mary show us how we should wait. We wait with a prayerful and humble heart that asks God to show us His mercy and power.

In three days an event happened that changed the world 2,000 years ago. In three days will you experience the event that can change your life?

Reading 1 1 Sm 1:24-28

In those days, Hannah brought Samuel with her, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour, and a skin of wine, and presented him at the temple of the LORD in Shiloh. Gospel Lk <u>1:46-56</u>
